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Aims and Objectives

The Order

The Order of St John is one of the oldest existing orders of chivalry in the World. Our tradition of Christian charity and service dates back to the 11th century. Our mottos are "Pro Fide" and "Pro Utilitate Hominum", the English translations of which are "For the Faith" and "For the Service of Humanity".

In the Northern Territory, the affairs of The Order are administered by St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. The governing body within this Incorporated Association is known as the St John Council.

Function of St John

In the Northern Territory, the services to humanity provided by St John include:

Training Branch

Provides the instruction of members of the public in the principles and practice of First Aid, Nursing, Hygiene and other allied or ancillary subjects.

Volunteer First Aid Services

The organisation provides, training and equipping of men, women and young persons to undertake, on a voluntary basis either as individuals or as organised groups, First Aid, Nursing and allied activities, in the streets, public places, hospitals, homes, places of work or elsewhere as occasion may require for the relief, transport, comfort or welfare of those in need. The Volunteer First Aid Services supports the St John Ambulance Service by the provision of volunteer ambulance officers and medical advisory input.

Contracts Department

Provides Paramedical, Clinical and Workshop services, to the mining, oil and gas industries and major infrastructure projects. The funds generated support the Volunteeer First Aid Services arm of the Organisation.

St John Ambulance Service

Provides, by agreement with the Northern Territory Government, the ambulance service throughout the Northern Territory. The responsibility for the administration and management of the St John Ambulance Service is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer and his Executive staff and utilises career and volunteer personnel on ambulances.

A Comprehensive Response

St John in the Northern Territory provides a comprehensive response service to the sick and injured. It commences with immediate First Aid training to the public, extends to the provision of First Aid services at public events and culminates in a high quality ambulance service, delivering pre hospital emergency care.

Maintenance of this comprehensive response system is a high priority within St John in the Northern Territory.


- An emergency and non-emergency ambulance service;

- A fully equipped workshop delivering custom vehicle, ambulance modifications and general servicing.


During 2009-2010 St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc experienced increases in activity, with Ambulance vehicles travelling 798,993 kilometres (up 1%), whilst in the process of transporting 30,751 patients (an increase of 1.7%), on 37,813 cases (up 1%). This year a change in direction, inline with Government policy with Clinic transports, resulted in a large number of non-emergency transports moving to external providers.

It came as no surprise to me to learn that yet again, for the 7th year in a row, Reader's Digest voted Paramedics as the most trusted profession in Australia. I am proud to be Chairman for such a worthy profession and I know that we have some very talented Paramedics here in the NT. This was highlighted again this year at the Paramedic of the Year Awards, hosted by the Hon. Kon Vatskalis. Congratulations to the winner for 2010, Samantha King from Darwin. To Sam and all of the 19 nominees, keep up the good work.

In June of this year, we had the privilege of welcoming the Lord Prior from England, Professor Anthony Mellows and his wife Elizabeth Mellows to Darwin. They were only here for a few days but within this short time we were honoured to have them attend and be involved within our Investiture and Graduation ceremony. This ceremony is one to remember, making history in more than one way as it saw the five preceding Deputy Priors for St John Ambulance NT since 1993, all in the one place at the one time.

Professor Mellows and Mrs Mellows received numerous tours of our centres and met many of our members. They concluded their trip with a good Aussie BBQ at the Palmerston Volunteer Centre – wherein Professor Mellows advised that it was his first BBQ since his tour of Australia commenced.







I would like to thank the Chair of the St John Ambulance NT Endowment Trust, Mr Andrew Bruyn and the Trust's Patron, Chief Justice Trevor Riley, as this year we were actively involved with promoting the Volunteer arm of the organisation by conducting a number of dinners to create awareness to the local business community of Darwin and Palmerston and by also running a major fundraising raffle. These were very successful events as we raised funds for our Volunteers and created an increased awareness of what we do to much of the community. We look forward to seeing what next year brings with further dinners in Alice Springs and awareness promotions across the whole of the Territory, as we carry this on into the New Year.

The year has been one of significant negotiation with Government as we attempt to establish a suitable Ambulance Service Contract for the years to come. The process has been slow and is still continuing with growth in service delivery resources and methods, being the ultimate outcome.

My thanks also go to all of St John's business colleagues, the Health Minister and the Government, Councillors, Members, Staff and Friends of St John for another successful year. I would also like to extend my sincere appreciation to the CEO, Ross Coburn for his exceptional dedication and hard work he continually contributes to ensure the organisation is operating at its best. We are privileged to have dedicated and knowledgeable staff and members and thank you all for your efforts.

I am pleased to present the 33rd Annual Training Branch Report as part of the St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc (St John NT) Annual Report.

First Aid and Paramedic Training continues to be delivered at the highest possible standard by our team of committed staff with valuable feedback received from participants about how we may be able to improve our services.

Paramedic Training College

During 2010, the Paramedic Training College (PTC) has successfully facilitated 2 recruit level courses commonly referred to as 'Clinical 1' for a combined total of 30 students; a Workplace Assessor course delivered by Dr Len Smith from Australian Based Learning Experiences; a Clinical 2 course for 8 students who are now preparing to qualify at Paramedic level and 3 driving courses.

Due to a large intake of 17 students in January 2010, PTC is currently preparing for 2 Specialist Scene Management and Patient Extrication courses to be facilitated across October and into November 2010. This will be repeated with 2 courses facilitated early next year to accommodate the large mid year intake which began in June 2010.

Paramedic Education Officer Brad Sanderson (ex St John NT and more recently Queensland Ambulance Service) has, since commencing his PTC role, has settled in well. Both Brad and Lynda McMeekin have received highly positive feedback from Student Paramedics. Brad's obvious commitment to his role has seen him contribute to the delivery of internal professional development workshops for Paramedic workplace assessors at all Ambulance Centers across the NT. The last workshop is currently scheduled in Nhulunbuy for early October 2010.

The purpose of the workshops were to review and enhance valid on-the-job assessments with both assessors and students alike. It is anticipated there will have been approximately 60 staff having attended some of which were Clinical Mentors, Paramedic Students, Operational Managers, OICs and Station Officers.

As part of a professional development exercise, Brad also attended an EMERTRAIN course, a multi casualty exercise conducted through National Critical Care Trauma Research Centre (NCCTRC). This was a national based exercise involving multiple agencies at Royal Darwin Hospital. The course was designed to test the resources and responses of national and local agencies. The benefits to St John NT of an exercise like goes along way to assisting our organisation with forward planning for service improvement purposes to ensure a greater response level in times of need. The skills and knowledge gained from this type of exercise also aims to be transferred across to Student Paramedics in training, particularly in relation to the PTC facilitated Rescue course.

During 2010 PTC, the Director Education and Training and the CEO held preliminary discussions with two Higher Education institutions in respect to our planned move toward Degree qualifications for Paramedic Officers. These discussions are ongoing as we strive to work through the intricacies of moving Paramedic Training from the Vocational Education and Training sector to the Higher Education sector – as is occurring throughout Australian and New Zealand.



First Aid

As a brief, current snapshot, between January 2010 – August 2010 First Aid Trainers travelled to the following destinations for first aid course delivery: Nhulunbuy x 6, Katherine x 6; McArthur River x 2; Alice Springs x 3; Groote Island x 3; Tennant Creek x 3; Santa Teresa x 2; Santos Meerinie Gas Fields x 2; Batchelor x 2; Granites x 3; Jabiru x 2; Swim Creek x 2; Daly River; Yirrkala; Ali Curung; Legune Station; Yarralin; Dagaragu; Minyerri; Kabulwarnamyo Outstation (West Arnhem); Wadeye; Nguiu; Timber Creek; Wildman River; Hodgson Downs Station; Bullo River Station; Borroloola; Ilpurla; King Valley; Maningrida; Galiwinku; and Millingimbi.

While Trainers have undertaken a lot of travel during the year, they have also experienced a heavier than normal training workload which at times became guite challenging. This was due to a number of resignations received from full time staff throughout the year. While any resignation is unfortunate, all members of our training team were supportive and wish their colleagues well for the future. During the busy periods encountered, the Training Department were fortunate to have the wonderful support of a number of Part-Time (Casual) trainers to assist us and we specifically acknowledge the valuable assistance of Geoff Lohmeyer, Christine Turner, Kelly Raven, Daniel Macmillan and Barbara Klesser. Currently there are 2 full time Trainer positions to fill which will allow us to be even more responsive in being able to meet customer needs and expectations for their training.

Following discussions between St John NT and the Human Resource Division of the Department of Education and Training which occurred in late 2009 and again in early 2010, the Training Department received a Purchase Order to the value of \$18,500. This amount has 'pre-purchased' first aid training under the 'Quality Teacher Program' being rolled out by the Department across the NT. During the year, our Trainers have travelled to Minyerri, Katherine and currently tentative arrangements have been made to travel to Milikapiti with other remote schools yet to be discussed and programmed.

Since the commencement of the 2010 school year, we have been inundated by requests from schools to deliver the 1hour EpiPen training session. During the year this training was delivered to 495 participants. The EpiPen program is not considered to be a significant income generator but is promoting the first aid services offered by St John-NT and it is hoped may prompt a number of teachers to complete a full first aid course. Due to the recent introduction of a new Anaphylaxis product namely the 'Anapen', St John-NT will now be delivering a session titled 'Adrenaline Auto Injectors' which covers both the EpiPen and Anapen devices.


For a number of years now, St John NT had been supplying CPR123 Manikins to all participants enrolled into accredited First Aid training. While these were a great gift and home learning resource, we have since steered away from that resource and have introduced our own 'St John NT stamped pens and key ring resuscitation face shields. This initiative has received very positive feedback from course participants as they feel these items are quite useful to their needs and it extensively promotes the name of St John within the community.

In early 2010 through some consistent 'lobbying' espousing the quality of St John First Aid training and the professionalism of our Trainers, the Training Department were successful in winning a 12 month first aid training arrangement with the Granites Gold Mine. This arrangement included the delivery of 10 x 2 day Apply First Aid courses, 8 – 10 Advanced Resuscitation courses and 1 or 2 Occupational First Aid courses. St John won the training from 3 other Alice Springs based training providers.

Throughout the year, it has been pleasing to see a substantial number of public and private customers returning to St John NT after previously completing their training with commercial competitors. A positive indication of the quality of our training programs is highlighted by the fact that some customer groups have been prepared to wait a period of time simply to ensure this training is delivered by our team.

Earlier in the year St John again met with representatives of Group Training NT to discuss further school based Work Ready first aid training for the second half of the year for delivery in 'remote' areas. Participant numbers for each remote location are identified in brackets. Groote Eylandt (8), Maningrida (14), Jabiru (23), Batchelor (15), Katherine (12), Borroloola (11), with Tennant Creek scheduled for delivery later in the year. Locally under this program we trained a total of 148 school students in the Darwin/Alice Springs regions and have further courses scheduled for delivery prior to the end of year.




In May 2010 a restructure of the Training Department occurred with Brendan Quirke taking a more strategic, planning role in training as the Director, Education and Training. Lynda McMeekin accepted an appointment as the Paramedic Education Manager and Annetta Albanese as the First Aid Training Manager.

Earlier in the year, representatives from the Training Department attended an Australian Quality Training Framework (AQTF) information session. The information session gave an insight to Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) re: National Regulations. Based on information which was passed on at this session responsibilities for accreditation of courses, RTO registrations and external auditing will be taken over in the near future by the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations (Federal), rather than local Department of Education bodies.

Once again across 2010, AQTF Quality Indicator reporting was nationally submitted. For two years now we have reported on the number of course completions/enrolments against all units and qualifications appearing on the St John NT Scope of Registration. This year however there was also a need to report on Employer and Learner feedback questionnaires for the 2009 period. Collated feedback stemming from the reports has indicated exceptionally satisfying results, with the majority of participants indicating they are completely satisfied with the services being provided by St John NT.

- Non Accredited Programs






All accredited first aid training courses are included in the Health Training Package (HLT07) and are 'marketed' under the Health Training Package nomenclatures allocated to them in HLT07. This ensures our customers receive a Statement of Attainment which is representative of the training they have completed.

Apply First Aid continues to be the training of choice in the Northern Territory as it nationally, both for individuals and for industry groups. Customers completing their first aid training all receive St John NT stamped pens and key ring resuscitation face shields.

There were a total of 9965 Learners who completed some form of first aid training delivered by St John-NT. This equates to an increase of 1094 since 2008/2009 and represents an average of 830 learners per month. This is an encouraging sign as we map our way forward and represents an average increase of 90 participants per month-based on last financial years figures.

Despite the financial challenges facing all businesses and individuals, St John-NT has managed to improve our participation rates over the previous year and we aim to achieve similar levels again in 2010-'11 with a 3% and 4% increase over the next two (2) financial year cycles. We continue to promote of the quality of St John NT training and our Trainers thereby ensuring Learners receive a valuable learning experience.

Some feedback continues to be received suggesting we should return to the old three day (3) format due to the amount of information forming part of first aid training as delivered in the NT, but generally customers have supported the two day (2) format (or 1 day with Flexible Learning), our primary course is now delivered in.

In closing I would like to acknowledge the wonderful work of our Training Department team (Trainers and Administration), and the support Training Branch receives from my St John Council colleagues, the Ambulance Service and, importantly, our support staff across the NT.

My particular thanks to our CEO, Ross Coburn, and I would like also to recognise the invaluable contribution of our part-time Trainers for their work covering weekend (and in many cases, weekday), training commitments. Thanks also to Daniel Macmillan for his work with the St John NT web site, www.stjohnnt.org.au. The site continues to prove is proving very popular among those looking at completing first aid training.

Thanks must also go to our sponsors including Perkins Shipping, for their greatly appreciated support during the year.

Commissioner's Report

In presenting my report to you this year I have given considerable thought to the service which is provided to the community by our dedicated members and the ever-changing times we find ourselves in. But I start by thanking all of our members for their tremendous effort throughout the past year.

I have been thinking about the way the younger generation thinks about volunteerism and also the way in which they go about finding out about volunteer organisations. It is important that we embrace the electronic age for everything we do, in particular for the future recruitment of our members. The days of people joining organisations for a lifetime of community work seems to be diminishing so it is vital that we become more flexible in regard to membership. The process of recruitment by individual divisions must provide new members with a clear structure and career path that will give them the tools to provide community service. One of the factors that has been reflected in the retention of new members is on the job training and the lack of sufficiently qualified and experienced members to mentor them. It is vital that new members have the appropriate training and are able to commence their community service work as quickly as possible. We have found that our public duties are increasing in number and size and we are being requested to attend more major duties. Our members come from dual income families with more stresses on daily lives which leave little room for volunteerism and training seems to be a focus rather than community service. One consideration could be the increase of infrastructure for support personnel so members can concentrate on providing the first aid service. There is a greater need to ensure we have accurate records for the recording of training and the provision of statistical information which could all be done by support staff. Despite the challenges ahead we must always focus on providing the best quality first aid service to our community.

We have had a busy year with many highlights and also some very sad times. We mourned the loss of our dear friend, Council Member Bernie Kilgariff and also our former Chairman, Richard Morris. Both Bernie and Richard made major contributions to St John in the Northern Territory and have left an indelible mark on our organisation.

We were privileged to host a volunteer social night visit for the Lord Prior, Professor Anthony Mellows and Mrs Elizabeth Mellows during their trip to Darwin. The volunteers held a casual barbeque at the Palmerston Volunteer Centre on Friday 4th June, 2010 and had the chance to meet and chat with the Lord Prior.

Shortly after the Lord Prior's visit the National First Aid Services Manager, Stephen Carter, Chief Commissioner, Paul Arbon, Deputy Chief Commissioner, Kieran Brown and National Youth Manager, Belinda Ding visited the Northern Territory. They travelled to Darwin and Alice Springs, met staff and volunteers and participated in the Finke Desert Race Duty in Alice Springs.

On a national level the Commissioners and Superintendents have discussed a broad range of issues including National Security, Resilience and Cross Branch Frameworks, National Response Guidelines, Leadership, the Role of the St John Ambulance Australia in the community and they have updated the Operations Branch Guidelines.



We are very excited about the possible establishment of a Cadet Division in Yirrkala in Arnhemland. Mark Ferguson and Mandy Paradise met with the community elders and the school principal from Yirrkala and received a very positive response. Eight indigenous students attended the first cadet meeting on Wednesday 24th February 2010. Thank you to Mark and Mandy from Nhulunbuy for their work.

The other newly formed division is the Palmerston Youth Division. Kelly Raven decided to form the division to bridge the gap between maturing cadets and young adults between the ages of 16 to 25. 




