About St John NT

St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. (St John NT) is a not-for-profit organisation with charitable status, dedicated to helping people in sickness, distress, suffering or danger. We have been active in the Northern Territory for over 70 years, and internationally as part of a wider organisation with a long and honourable history.



Ambulance Services

Comprehensive emergency and non-emergency road ambulance and patient transport services, including two Triple Zero (000) communications centres, under contract to the Northern Territory Government.



First Aid Training

St John NT delivers nationally recognised training in partnership with St John Ambulance Australia (RTO 88041), specialising in accredited public, community and industry-specific first aid and mental health training.



First Aid Kits & Products

Retail outlets in Darwin and Alice Springs stock an extensive range of first-aid kits, consumables and AEDs (Automated External Defibrillators), as well as medical and rescue equipment. St John NT provides a re-stocking service for Northern Territory businesses and also provides online product sales via the national St John online shop.



Volunteers

Qualified first aid personnel and paramedics who give up their time to serve the community by providing health coverage at many social, sporting, cultural and major community events across the Northern Territory.



First Aid in Schools Program

A free program delivering ageappropriate first aid training to children from pre-school to Year 9.



Youth Cadet Program

St John NT cadets learn life-saving skills in a safe but challenging environment, participating in cadet competitions and working alongside adults. Cadets have the opportunity to take part in accredited courses to help with employment opportunities and provide quality first aid services to the Northern Territory's wide range of community, social, sporting and music events.



Contract Paramedical Services

Contract paramedics and 4WD ambulance hire, assist and support mining production, industry and major events.



Community Education

Providing first aid education to the public by way of structured activities, information sessions and specifically designed training sessions. We visit a range of child care centres, shopping centres, clubs, remote communities, support groups and public events.



Mechanical Workshop

Fully equipped mechanical and fleet service centres providing auto repairs, modifications and servicing to the entire St John NT fleet.

Delivering custom design and fit out of emergency ambulance vehicles to any specifications. Workshops located in Darwin and Alice Springs also provide a wide range of mechanical services to members of the general public.



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Save a life award



She had bitten her tongue, and when he saw blood coming from his mum's mouth, 12-year-old Brendon leapt into action.

The brave young man tried to wake his mum, who was unresponsive, while staying calm for his little sister.

Brendon dialled Triple Zero (000) and carefully listened to the St John NT Emergency Medical Dispatcher's instructions. He made sure his mum's airway was clear and that she was lying in the correct position, and he listened for her heartbeat.

Paramedics who rushed to the scene praised the young hero for his amazing efforts in saving his mum's life.

Brendon's mum has since been diagnosed with a medical condition. If it hadn't been for her brave son's quick action, she could have choked on her tongue and died.

Brendon is a hero to his mum, his family, friends and to all of us. He is such a remarkable, resilient, brave and confident young person. To be able to save the life of a loved one during a time of very high stress is testament to anyone's character, and to be able to do this at the age of 12 is worthy of everyone's admiration and respect.

HOW WE ARE DELIVERING:

- Our ambulance service answered 52,718 Triple Zero (000) calls and responded to 44,233 incidents.
- Our First Aid in Schools program has continued to perform strongly, training 10,515 students this year and achieving the wonderful milestone of 70,000 students trained in First Aid skills across the Territory.
- Our First Aid trainers delivered training to 10,054 Territorians, building resilience in our community members should they be faced with a life threatening emergency.
- Our volunteers supported 887 community and public events through the provision of first aid services.
- Our newly launched Public Access Defib program, with the goal of 1,000 PAD units across the Territory by 2021, aims to reduce the death rate attributable to Sudden Cardiac Arrest.



Our organisation has been a trusted partner of the Northern Territory community for over 70 years and I am pleased to see our presence and contribution continue to grow and strengthen. As a part of the Order of St John in Australia, we strive to be the leading provider of first aid and ambulance services in the Northern Territory and St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. (St John NT) throughout the last year has continued to fulfil this mission.

As you read this annual report, you will notice that the breadth of activities that we contribute to as a community partner continues to grow. Our paramedics and volunteers have long been active at large scale events such as the Finke Desert Race and Bass in the Grass, as well as supporting local community events. This year, we were proud to provide emergency and first aid services to the Arafura Games 2019 held in Darwin.

Continuing to support our community in times of need, we were there for Cyclone Trevor with a strong presence in Darwin and Katherine for evacuees.

We have focussed on strengthening our relationships with the Northern Territory Government and the Health Minister, as well as those with relationships with St John Australia executive. We believe that strong ties and close collaboration across all State and Territory St John member organisations will benefit all of us in the ongoing achievement of our mission across Australia.

I would like to thank my fellow Board Members for their ongoing support and commitment to purpose. This year, as a Board, we have strengthened our resolve for strong, responsible governance. I would also like to extend my thanks to members of the Executive Leadership Team for their valued contributions and informed input into the direction of our organisation.

Chief Executive Officer's Report

In 2018-19, St John NT has continued to deliver on its mission to save lives in the Northern Territory by being the leading provider of first aid and ambulance services.



HOW WE ARE DELIVERING:

- This year saw the launch of our Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) program. The current survival rate from Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) in Australia is only 10%. That means that 27,000 people die each year from a SCA. For every minute that passes without treatment, the chance of survival decreases by 10%. St John NT is passionate about increasing the survival rate of Territorians and is on a mission to have 1,000 PADs across the Territory by 2021.
- We have had a very deliberate focus on developing partnerships with key organisations for the benefit of the community. This has included the development of a partnership with the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress to provide alternate pathways to medical care in Alice Springs to ensure the right care is provided in the right timeframe.

We have also extended ourselves beyond our borders to work with other St John organisations. We were proud to work alongside our colleagues at St John Papua New Guinea in providing medical support for APEC 2018 and we continue to support them through their transformational journey with the provision of staff expertise.

Investing in our people

We know that to continue to be successful in our mission, we need to invest in our people. In 2018, St John NT commenced a leadership development program in conjunction with Driftwood Leadership, to invest in our staff and volunteers at various stages in their leadership journey, thereby investing in our future.

Following on from the landmark Beyond Blue research into the mental health and wellbeing of emergency service personnel, we launched our Mental Health and Well-being Strategy 2019-22

focussing on the four key areas of:

- Identification of risks and mitigation of consequences
- Reducing barriers to support
- Provision of mental health wellbeing education & training
- Strength through partnerships

2018 was the inaugural year for St John NT coming together to celebrate our organisation as one through the St John NT Annual Awards. These awards brought us together and celebrated all of our amazing team members including volunteers, paramedics and all of our corporate staff.

ANNUAL ST JOHN DAY CELEBRATES CHARITABLE WORK

To celebrate the service that St John volunteers provide to their communities all over the world, St John NT took part in the international St John Day celebrations on June 24. A church service was held the day prior at The Christ Church Cathedral in Darwin.

"It is both reassuring and admirable to find that there are still people who are prepared to volunteer their time and effort to continue the tradition of caring for others that was established so many centuries ago by the Hospitallers of the Order of St John of Jerusalem," Dame of the Order of St John, Lesley King, said.

St John volunteers play an integral part in the community. The dedicated service of more than 500 St John NT volunteers began with the formation of the St John Ambulance Brigade in Darwin in the 1950s.

Since then, St John NT has grown into one of the Northern Territory's most-valued not-for-profit organisations, providing frontline ambulance services and offering community education and first aid services across the Territory.

"But for us, St John Day isn't just about our volunteers," Director of Volunteer Services, Annette Plowman, said.

"St John Day celebrates every part of our charitable organisation highlighting and reminding us of our values – integrity, respect, quality, dedication and compassion – that are the pillars on which we base our day-to day work as volunteers, paramedics, patient transport officers and Emergency Medical Dispatchers at the Triple Zero (000) call centres."

Director of Ambulance Services Report

MATTHEW EASTHAM Director of Ambulance Services

Ambulance Services across the world are operating with an increasing speed and intensity as we grow and expand our service delivery models and seek out new ways to meet the needs of our communities. St John NT is no exception.



HOW WE ARE DELIVERING:

We have undertaken significant reform over the past two years. Community expectations relating to service provision remain high and we are well placed to deliver a very high standard of emergency, non-emergency and support services to the people of the Northern Territory.

The St John NT staffed Emergency Communications Centre answered over 52,000 Triple Zero (000) calls for ambulance assistance. This represents around 32% of all Triple Zero calls for emergency services across the Territory. It is an outstanding contribution by our highly qualified Emergency Medical Dispatchers, who have undoubtedly saved many lives in those first few crucial minutes.

Our paramedics and patient transport officers have responded over 42,000 times. Our responsiveness continues to improve Territory wide and we are becoming far more dynamic in our deployment of resources. As a small ambulance service looking after dispersed populations, it is essential that frontline service delivery continues to be one of our strategic focus areas.



Building stronger relationships

Building stronger relationships has been a cornerstone strategy of the Ambulance Services leadership group. This has seen consolidation of our partnerships, including with key groups such as the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress to improve access to culturally appropriate health care in Alice Springs, and the Aurora project supporting aboriginal paramedic student placements in Alice Springs. Our inaugural Intensive Care Paramedic Internship was supported by Edith Cowan University and they will continue to partner with us in the future provision of education services. We continue to collaborate with ambulance services across Australia, including Ambulance Victoria, who we are engaged with in the development of our nationally aligned and accredited driving standards program. Internationally, a supportive relationship with St John Papua New Guinea is evolving and we continue to be involved in supporting paramedic student study tours in Bali.

Implementing our reform program

We will continue with our reform program, which will see St John NT continue to evolve. This has at times been challenging, yet highly rewarding. This year, we have consolidated the Critical Response Unit into our deployment model and it has proved to be highly successful in the provision of 'in field' critical patient care and support to our people. The newly commissioned role of Duty Managers in our Emergency Communications Centre has commenced and this is providing enhanced support to our people, our patients and complex critical incidents. The Siren Electronic Patient Care Record project has seen significant upgrades in application software and configuration, as well as new in-vehicle hardware. A combined total of 11 new first line response vehicles have been rolled out across the Territory during the reporting period.

Partnering with:













Our commitment to Territory business and local purchasing by our St John NT workshop is commendable with the majority of manufacturing and all vehicle fit-out's now being completed locally. It has been a truly amazing effort by the entire St John NT team in progressing these initiatives and I sincerely congratulate everyone.

'Hands Off' Initiative

On July 19, St John NT launched its 'Hands Off' initiative. This initiative is aimed at promoting the right of every paramedic to come to work and feel safe. Every year, on average, one in six Territorians uses an ambulance and our paramedics attend more than 52,000 cases across the NT. To be able to care for those in need and help our community, our paramedics need to be able to do their job uninterrupted and in a safe environment. Unfortunately, this does not always happen.

Supporting our community

Ambulance Services have supported an increased number of community, sporting and motor sport events across the Northern Territory. An increased focus on logistics, equipment, risk assessments and medical plans has seen our involvement grow. We are truly grateful for the increasing opportunities we now have to work together as one team with our volunteers in the provision of first aid services and advanced medical care at events. Our people have supported us and the hours of event coverage by ambulance services has been the highest ever. Our involvement in the events such as the 2019 Finke Desert Race, Darwin Triple Crown V8 Supercars, Garma Festival of Aboriginal Culture and Red CentreNATS again proved to be challenging, yet highly enjoyable for all involved.

I have absolute confidence in every staff member and their commitment and dedication to delivering the very best ambulance service we can. As the Director of Ambulance Services, I remain honoured to lead such a wonderful team.



CYCLONE TREVOR

Search and rescue operations throughout the Territory

March was cyclone month with Tropical Cyclone Trevor first making landfall on the Cape York Peninsula. As Trevor moved over the Gulf of Carpentaria, a State of Emergency was declared for 72 hours from Friday 22 March. Trevor made a second landfall east of Borroloola as a Category 4 system on Saturday 23 March. Gales were recorded at Borroloola of up to 139 km/h. The size of Trevor was said to be the same size as New South Wales. It required the evacuation of Groote Eylandt and Borroloola residents to displaced persons centres in Katherine and Darwin, which have a capacity to take 5000 people at each location. Further evacuees presented at Nhulunbuy and Tennant Creek. St John NT provided volunteer and paramedic support to displaced persons and to search and rescue operations throughout the Territory. This was a significant event for our operational areas and together we provided an exceptional level of medical and support services.



ULTIMATE FESTIVAL OF WHEELS

All roads lead to Alice

All roads led to Alice over the Father's Day weekend when the Ultimate Festival of Wheels returned to the Red Centre. Celebrating everything on 4 wheels over 3 action packed days, the event showcased the very best in street machines, elite show cars, hot rods, classics & exotics. St John NT has been providing the event medical coverage since its inception in 2015 and, as the event has grown, so has our response. A major incident in 2017 has only strengthened the event medical planning, preparation and response effort. A large contingent of St John NT staff and volunteers attended the 3 day event and successfully executed the event mission brief.





AURORA PROJECT

Supporting job internships for equitable participation

This year, St John NT entered into a partnership with The Aurora Project's Internship program. The program focuses on supporting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and graduates via funded internships as pathways to jobs through practical placement opportunities. The purpose is to facilitate professional development by building career experiences and opportunities in an individual's area of study. The Aurora Project vision is a future where there is no education gap and where the next generation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians achieve equitable participation at the highest level – in the professions, in boardrooms and across government. We are delighted to partner with the Aurora Project as a host organisation in support of this vision. To date we have successfully hosted two Aurora students and we look forward to additional placements in the coming months.

ARAFURA GAMES SUPPORT

Enabling a safe environment

This year, the Northern Territory Government hosted the Arafura Games, the first time since 2011. The games originally started as a sporting event for those nations touching the Arafura Sea. They now stretch well beyond to include countries such as the USA. The games bring together able bodied and disabled athletes to compete in a unified program. St John NT proudly participated in the Arafura Games, providing first aid and ambulance services through our volunteers and ambulance staff. We provided services that covered areas including Darwin Sailing Club, Waterfront Precinct and the Marrara Sporting Precinct.

St John NT leadership staff were also an integral partner in planning the event with organisers to ensure the games could be enjoyed by all participants and spectators in a safe environment. A clear command structure was put in place prior to the event, including an event plan which established a clear St John NT command structure for the Games, allowing Operational Duty Managers to focus on day to day operations

The Arafura Games was a successful event that demonstrated the strength of our volunteers and staff as a team.







CONGRESS PARTNERSHIP

Providing culturally appropriate and beneficial healthcare

In April this year, St John NT and the Central Australian Aboriginal Congress (Congress) commenced a partnership to allow the transfer of low acuity Aboriginal patients by St John NT to Congress Northside Clinic in Alice Springs. The aim is to provide culturally appropriate primary healthcare services to Aboriginal patients. Plans are in place to expand this alternative care pathway to all four Congress clinics within the Alice Springs Township.









FINKE DESERT RACE

What an event! We had it covered.

Over the Queen's birthday long weekend, one of the Territory's biggest and most iconic events takes place in Alice Springs.

The Tatts Finke Desert Race is an off road, multi terrain two-day race for bikes, cars, buggies and quads through desert country from Alice Springs to the small Aputula (Finke) community. This year saw the largest ever field of competitors tackle the gruelling 452km of unforgiving track. With 950 car and bike competitors registered, St John NT assembled our largest medical response in the history of the event. Consisting of sixty plus staff and volunteers, we

manned 3 medical helicopters, 20 emergency vehicles and 6 dedicated medical checkpoints to provide a successful medical response. We provided support 24 hours a day and over 3 days to not only the competitors, but to over 15,000 spectators who lined the 226km race track from Alice Springs through Finke. Despite the huge field of competitors and record spectator numbers, patient presentation rates were, thankfully, low compared to previous years. A massive thank you to all our people for their dedication and professionalism over the event.

SUPERCARS DARWIN TRIPLE CROWN

A collaborative effort

The Supercars Darwin Triple Crown saw a great collaborative effort from the St John NT team with Paramedics, Volunteers, Patient Transport Officers and Emergency Medical Dispatchers all working together to provide excellent care to patrons and competitors. The team spirit was on show with our team working closely with our friends at the NT Major Events Corporation and the National Critical Care Trauma Response Centre across the 3 day event.



Providing remote area medical support for the community

St John NT volunteers and staff provided medical support to the Garma Festival of Traditional Culture. Each year, an estimated 2500 visitors gather and camp at Gulkula, a traditional ceremonial meeting ground that is historically significant to the Yolngu people of the north east Arnhem Land. Its location is remote, 40kms on a dusty unsealed road from the township of Nhulunbuy. The provision of medical support to Garma provides St John NT with a unique opportunity to demonstrate its agility in the provision of medical support in remote areas with a collaborative response between our paramedics and volunteers. This year's event strengthened our relationship with the Yothu Yindi Foundation and we are proud to be supporting Garma into the future.







Working with St John Papua New Guinea



On the 10th November 2018, over 60 paramedics from Australia and New Zealand arrived in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea to support the local St John Ambulance with the APEC event. They were welcomed by traditional dancers from the Southern Highlands and the Huli Wigmen from Hela Province.

The Australian High Commissioner to Papua New Guinea, Bruce Davis, welcomed all the paramedics to the country with a gathering held at his home and thanked them all for their support for the upcoming APEC event.

Intensive Care Paramedic Mark Ferguson, Paramedic Elenka Egan and Emergnecy Medical Dispatcher (EMD) Emma Trenerry from St John NT were among the group who volunteered their time to attend.

This was a great experience getting to see how an ambulance service is run in another country not far from our own.

St John is the statutory ambulance service for PNG and operates the 111 service. A private hospital operates an ambulance for its clients when needed.

There are 4 ambulances servicing a population of approximately 1 million people in Port Moresby. Traffic crashes, snake bites and child birth makes up the majority of cases attended to by St John Ambulance PNG.

Port Moresby General Hospital (POMGEN) is the major referral hospital for the country and its major specialty's include:

- Emergency Department
- Surgery
- Orthopedics
- Cardiology
- Obstetrics and Gynaecology
- Maternity
- CT and X-ray facilities

The city is supported by a smaller hospital at Gerehu.

There are two main private hospitals. Paradise Private Hospital and Pacific International Hospital (PIH)

St John Ambulance PNG employed an extra 100 staff and trained them in first aid to assist with the APEC event and driving of the Australian and New Zealand paramedics.

Leading up to the three day event, there was plenty to do - stocking trauma kits and ambulances, cleaning of vehicles and paramedics familiarising themselves with the local area and locations of the hospitals. Australian and New Zealand paramedics were paired up with a local St John Ambulance Health Extension Officers (HEO) to drive them around while on shift and assist with any translating as required. Some of the paramedics did ride alongs with the business as usual crews prior to APEC starting and reported it as a very eye opening experience. On arrival at POM GEN (Port Moresby General Hospital) with a patient, the paramedics reported that at that time there was approximately 100 women in the hospital in various stages of labour. The maternity ward was full and many of them were sitting in the Emergency Department on chairs or if they were lucky enough to be on a bed it was in a hallway. This was not an uncommon occurrence.

New Zealand Government provided funding to St John PNG to build a new communications center which was completed just 2 weeks prior to the start of the APEC event. Funding was also provided to St John PNG for a new Computer Aided Dispatch system (CAD) which all of their EMD's required training in prior to go live

for the APEC event. Preparation in the communications center for the APEC Event was well underway and all PNG EMD's who had been trained in the CAD system were navigating their way around the system, taking Triple One (111) calls, entering the job into the CAD so that the dispatcher could then dispatch the ambulance crew. Considering some of the EMD's had never used a computer before they had picked up the new learned skills quickly. Prior to the funding and the upgrade the St John PNG communications center was in a tiny room with a few telephones and some radio equipment.

Once APEC was in full swing there were approx 30 vehicles on the move that the Communications center had to keep up with their locations. As dignitaries from each country arrived they were collected from Jacksons Airport in a Maserati and their motorcade then followed them where ever they wished to go. This was quite a challenge for the St John PNG EMD's as they are used to only having 4 ambulances to dispatch. With the support of the EMD's from Australia and New Zealand they did well. The connections with the new CAD and the internet at times were challenging but the team was well prepared and as a redundancy measure they also tracked the ambulance crews on a whiteboard using magnets. On the whole the CAD stood up well and operated as designed.

After a very exhausting few days the APEC event was finished and it was time clean up, pack up, say goodbyes and go our separate ways. Many of us having met and made new friends, gained knowledge and experience from others and a new found respect for our working conditions back home.

Volunteering in the PNG



In 2019, Stephanie Pilat was fortunate enough to spend nine weeks with St John Ambulance PNG in a volunteering capacity and through a secondment supported by St John NT. During this tim, Stephanie worked closely with the Ambulance Emergency Co-Ordination Centre staff in a mentoring capacity and also developing procedures to meet the needs of their patients in the best possible way. Stephanie has received high praise from St John Ambulance PNG for building a triage system into their Computer Aided Dispatch program. The triage system assists the emergency coordination staff in asking Triple One (111) callers the right

questions to determine the emergency and being able to provide the callers with first-aid instructions. For us at St John NT and ambulance services across the world such a triage tool has been in place for many years, but for St John Ambulance PNG this was an entirely new concept to them that achieved instant lifesaving results. The huge amounts of trauma and complex cases, along with the language and cultural barriers were a major challenge for Stephanie, but the respect and gratitude she was shown for providing her time and effort made the experience entirely worthwhile.

Mechanical Workshop Report





AMBULANCE FLEET IMPROVEMENTS

- In 2018/19, the workshop was able to complete 11 new Ambulance Service vehicles including 3 Critical Response Unit vehicles for Darwin and Alice Springs and 2 new design Toyota Land Cruisers. These were trialled and tested at Finke 2019 with great feedback and are now located in the regional stations of Nhulunbuy and Katherine. The workshop also added 2 new ambulance command vehicles to the Toyota Fortuna fleet and 3 new Mercedes ambulances.
- The Patient Transport Service vehicles replacement program commenced with the first new design vehicles being rolled out. There will be a total of four vehicles built under this program.
- A number of the Mercedes ambulances have undergone a power supply upgrade with the use of a 150 Amp dry cell AGM battery in the rear cab paired with a large 1500 watt inverter and supporting hardware to cope with the large electrical loads created from vehicle systems. This upgrade will ensure that all systems will operate seamlessly for years to come.



Retail

The retail department has continued to offer a great quality of service to the community through its high end service and repair workshop. The retail workshop has the expertise to carry out all repairs and maintenance on all types of motor vehicles with all profits then supporting our volunteers and their community service.

St John NT's workshop continues to work with Australian Federal Police, Border Force, NT Bush Fires and NT Fleet in building contracted commercial vehicles.

Builds

The builds facility continued to grow over the year, completing a number of projects with more underway. These projects include 4x4 Toyota HiAce ambulances for Miwatj Health Aboriginal Corporation in Nhulunbuy and a bespoke 4x4 Mercedes Sprinter ambulance for Central Aboriginal Congress due for completion in the third guarter of 2019.

The workshop has also completed a number of remote 4x4 Land cruiser builds for Katherine West, Sunrise Health, Nganampa Health and NT Fleet throughout the financial year.

During this financial year, St John NT has undertaken improvements and increased capacity in the vehicle design and build facility. All projects undertaken by the St John NT Fleet Workshop, whether it's a fleet build or for retail, have been designed and fabricated using only local Darwin businesses. St John NT Workshop aims to use local businesses wherever possible with all projects.

Farewell

After 40 years of dedicated service with St John NT, we sadly said goodbye to Workshop Manager Mark O'Shaughnessy. Mark has been invaluable in growing the Fleet Workshop services to support both Ambulance Services, through vehicle builds and servicing, and to our Volunteers, by increasing the funds that support them by growing the business. Mark will be greatly missed. We hope you enjoy retirement.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

As an organisation, we are continually reviewing our services and evolving to meet the needs of the communities we serve. Volunteering is at the heart of our operation, and the financial sustainability of our volunteer service is paramount. This year saw the introduction of Event Health Services (EHS) as a 12-month trial to generate additional funds for the sole purpose of supporting volunteering.

This strategic initiative saw many hours of ground work undertaken with event organisers, whom we have provided volunteer services to for many years, and with new clients to review their needs.

This initiative has provided us with many insights and lessons on how we should proceed into the future to ensure we meet the needs of communities and customers, and have the right people with the right skill level to continue to provide first aid coverage at events across the Territory.



Volunteer of the Year

On the 1st of November 2018, St John NT held its combined Annual Awards Ceremony. We were pleased to award Christine Turner 'Adult of the Year – Northern Region' and Benjamin Rowley 'Adult of the Year – Southern Region'. The award for Cadet of the Year was presented to Ms Elisabeth Boyle of Alice Springs Division.

The overall Division of the Year was presented to Alice Springs Adult Division.



National Cadet Competitions

We are very proud to share the results of this year's Annual National Cadet Competitions, where we were awarded first overall State/ Territory champion. This was an accomplishment not achieved since 1986. Luke McLaughlin also was awarded second in the category of 'Cadet Leader.'

A team of five travelled to Melbourne to participate and did an exemplary job of representing St John NT. The team consisted of Luke McLaughlin (Cadet Leader), Elisabeth Boyle, Indianna Bramley, Sarah Brown and Stephanie McMillan and was supported by adult members Melanie Bramley (Superintendent of Palmerston Cadet Division) and Julie Murray (Territory Officer for Youth).

The book was launched by Mr Craig O'Halloran, Patron of St John NT on the 22nd of May, in conjunction with National Volunteer Week.

St John Ambulance Member Convention

The Richard Morris Award, which recognises volunteers who have given the most number of volunteer hours to their communities in the Southern and Northern Region, was expanded this year to include another category of 'Outstanding Community Contribution'. I was honoured to attend the St John Ambulance Member Convention in May with the 2019 winners; Regina Sellar, Lachlan Ross, and Shayne Pomeroy.

The theme for this year's conference was 'Mission Possible' and it certainly inspired all of us to think about what is possible.

"This was a wonderful opportunity for all in attendance to network with other St John members from interstate and internationally," said volunteer and St John NT employee, Regina Sellar.

As we look up and toward the future it provides me with great joy to have joined St John NT this year as the Director of Volunteer Services and to work with so many people who are genuinely interested and committed to honouring our history and being a part of the change we need to see.



NEW TRAINING CENTRE OPENS FOR ST JOHN

More people across Central Australia will learn important life-saving first aid skills thanks to the official opening of the new St John Volunteer and Training Centre in Alice Springs, which can now provide better services to its large volunteer network.

In September 2018, Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure, Transport and Regional Development Michael McCormack, said the new centre's state-of-the-art training facilities would play a pivotal role in educating volunteers.

"The new centre will expand St John's first aid training division, providing more courses to government employees, private businesses and the wider Central Australian community," Mr McCormack said.

"The community will really notice the benefits in times of natural disaster, when the centre will support emergency responses, disaster management and relief."

Country Liberals Senator for the Northern Territory, Nigel Scullion, said the new facility would serve the people of Alice Springs and Central Australia well into the future.

"The centre has three training halls and a conference room, along with kitchenette facilities on both levels and a staff kitchen on the first floor. It also has offices, storerooms, a reception area, and car spaces for 12 vehicles," Senator Scullion said.

"The project has had a direct economic impact with 60 construction jobs and 10 ongoing jobs. We are delivering more jobs for Centralians and better community infrastructure to continue to make the Territory a great place to live.

"St John Ambulance has been part of the Alice Springs community for 50 years and this new centre will not only allow them to continue, but expand to train more volunteers and provide more health care services across Central Australia."

St John NT CEO, Judith Barker, said the new Alice Springs St John Volunteer and Training Centre would make a crucial difference to the lives of people across Central Australia.

"Thanks to the generosity of the Federal Government, we are now able to provide an open, welcoming environment conducive to learning, interaction and involvement. This new, centrally located facility will provide state of the art training facilities for St John and an ability to increase the provision of first aid training that will benefit the entire community," Ms Barker said.

"The new centre is a flagship for St John

and its construction will allow us to develop and grow with the local environment and needs."

"St John volunteers are a fantastic team of people servicing the community and keeping people safe at public events. Continuing over 50 years of volunteer service to Central Australia and providing more than 2600 volunteer hours to the Alice Springs community every year, the new centre will enable us to expand our training package delivery while allowing our volunteers to continue their admirable work in professionally servicing over 900 public events a year, including local football and netball games and iconic events such as the Red Centre Nats, Tatt's Finke Desert Race, the Camel Cup and the Henley on Todd Regatta."

The project was jointly funded with the Federal Government investing \$2,365,173 and St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. \$788,392.





Our Community Education team work directly with the Northern Territory community teaching free first aid sessions. These sessions are individually tailored to meet the needs of groups to help push aside obstacles that would normally stand in the way of people acquiring first aid skills. Barriers such as age, funding, language, culture and many more are broken down through Community Education sessions and through our First Aid in Schools program. The aim is to create an awareness of first aid as a lifesaving skill as well as developing these important skills in the community.

Early in 2019, we celebrated a milestone of delivering vital First Aid skills to 70,000 school aged children across the Territory through our First Aid in Schools program. We believe that there is no better place to start than in our schools. Every child in the Territory should have access to vital first aid knowledge and with the First Aid in Schools program this is possible.

Aimed at school aged students (Preschool – Year 9), each lesson is presented in short sessions of around an hour. Students learn all the basics including calling Triple Zero (000), about our St John NT paramedics, what an emergency is along with varying injury and

emergency based management skills such as snakebites, wound care, recovery position, CPR and more.

Community Education also provide free sessions for the children and adults at early childcare centres, early learning centres, community groups, sporting groups, parents groups just to name a few. We are privileged to continue our strong relationship with the Michael Long Leadership and Learning Centre (MLLLC) and to teach first aid to students from various communities across the NT.

Working with other organisations

We work regularly with Territory Parenting Support, Cowdy Ward, Scouts, Girl Guides, School of the Air, Home Schooling, travelling families in caravan parks, CAAPS, FORWAARD, STEPS Education and Training and more.







BARUNGA TRIP

SEPTEMBER 22ND 2018

In September 2018, a local community elder in Barunga stepped forward to request our training.

Heartbreakingly, the community were unable to help a young man who drowned in a nearby waterhole as they did not have the skills to do so. After hearing the tragic news our Community Education team conducted many first aid skills sessions at the school as well as at other schools in the area to help to ensure that such an event could be prevented in the future.

This tragic event triggered a push within the community and the neighbouring community Beswick to provide the lifesaving skills to make communities stronger and more resilient to such events.

St John NT Community Education team were able to train over 100 primary and senior students as well as the adults in the school. The members of the community were eternally grateful for the support of St John NT and for taking the time to deliver these potentially lifesaving skills.

MULTI ORGANISATION COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT


OCTOBER - DECEMBER 2018

Our Community Education team were invited to participate in Community Engagement Days that are run by Northern Territory Emergency Services (NTES) and Red Cross. The idea behind these days in the community is to help to engage the community members and spread our emergency messaging before the cyclone season.

With valuable funding coming from NTES and Red Cross we were able to reach many rural communities and not only teach all students through the school but conduct sessions with the adults within the communities.

The communities we travelled to from October to December were Wurrumiyanga, Beswick, Daly River, Galiwinku, Kalano, Milikapiti, Milyakburra, Canteen Creek and Titjikala Community.

Not only were these trips a success and well received by members of the communities, we have also built solid foundations and relationships for the future and future events with the communities and other organisations.



MILESTONE ACHIEVEMENTS FOR COMMUNITY EDUCATION

On 11th September, our Community Education team took out the '2018 Resilient Australia Community Award' for the Northern Territory as part of the Remote Indigenous Access Project.

The Remote Indigenous Access Project is a health education initiative that increases the resilience of remote children and young people. With extra training and support in these remote communities, we are giving young Territorians the ability to help themselves and their families, as well as their communities, in times of need or in an emergency.

With this project, our Community Education team were also shortlisted for the '2018 Resilient Australia National Award' held in Brisbane on the 8th November 2018. Although we did not take this one out, our Community Education Team were honoured to be scored so highly and were proud to walk away with 'Highly Commended'.



70,000 STUDENTS TRAINED FOR FREE!

With 70,000 school students having now received free, life-saving first aid training through the award-winning St John NT First Aid in Schools Program, we celebrated in a small ceremony at Dropstone Middle School.

Established in 2010, FAIS is a health education initiative of St John NT designed to make first aid a part of every Territorian's life – starting with the youngest Territorians. The program is tailored to children in primary and high school who learn first aid skills ranging from checking for danger and calling an ambulance, through to resuscitation, bleeding control, managing fractures and other medical emergencies such as stroke or heart attack.

Ms Barker said St John NT first trialled the program in 2010 with pilot sessions in Nhulunbuy and Yirrkala in East Arnhem Land. The innovative program quickly gained national interest and now, more than 1 million children have been trained in life-saving first aid skills by St John Ambulance across Australia.

"Last year alone, our Community Education teams in the Northern Territory taught more than 13,300 school students crucial first aid skills," Ms Barker

said. "That means there are 13,300 empowered and resilient young people all over the NT – including in some of the most remote communities – who now have greater confidence in responding to accidents, illness or emergencies."

"At St John NT, we work closely with the NT Government, local schools, health services providers, Elders and Traditional Owners and other relevant stakeholders to deliver our tailored programs for young people."

"The training has significant outcomes in terms of injuries being quickly self or community treated, rather than relying on external emergency services. Skills gained through the St John NT First Aid in Schools program can prevent deaths and save lives."

St John NT Community Education Officer, Hayley Edge, said the skills taught in the program were "just as important as reading and writing".

Funding for the program is provided by grants and donations St John NT receives from generous Territorians and businesses, and from the proceeds of commercial activities such as St John NT first aid training, first aid kit sales and restocking, and mechanical workshop services.

January 2019 saw the commencement of our new First Aid Training Manager Ms Sara Zietsman, who has been concentrating heavily on workforce development and RTO compliance. Our Trainers negotiated a new 3 year First Aid Trainers Enterprise Agreement which was approved in February 2019.

Our First Aid sales team have also been busy, adding new restocking trips out of Darwin to our calendar in response to customer requests and the continuation of remote community trips by our Alice Springs team.

Delivering the Public Access Defib Program

November saw the introduction of the St John NT Public Access Defibrillator Program, aiming to get 1,000 publically accessible defibrillators across the Territory over the next three years. Our team has already been busy delivering defibrillators and providing familiarisation training to a number of remote sites including the Tiwi Islands and communities located in the Katherine region as well as more tourism focussed areas such as the Howard Springs Nature Park.

Providing for our Alice Springs volunteers

The St John NT Charity Golf Day was held in Alice Springs and thanks to the generous support of local business, in particular Red Centre Technology Partners, was a great success raising funds for our Alice Springs volunteers. A family open day was also held at the new Peers Talbot Volunteer and Training centre to allow Alice Springs families an opportunity to see this great new facility.

The new financial year will also see new vehicles for our restocking and training team in Alice Springs, complete with new livery as we launch our new campaign "We're here for you".

ST JOHN NT LAUNCHES PROGRAM TO INCREASE CARDIAC ARREST SURVIVAL RATES

In March 2019, St John NT officially launched its Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) program, which will see the charitable organisation place 1000 defibrillators in public spaces across the Northern Territory.





"In Australia, only one in ten people survive a sudden cardiac arrest," St John NT CEO Judith Barker said.

"International programs similar to ours have proven that if a defibrillator is applied within the first few minutes, survival rates can be as high as 70 per cent."

"Cardiac arrest can happen to anyone, any time," Ms Barker said. "Sudden cardiac arrest is the abrupt loss of heart function which usually results from an electrical disturbance in the heart that disrupts its pumping action, stopping blood flow to a person's body."







"Unfortunately, if treatment isn't initiated immediately, chances of survival are incredibly low."

"That is why we want defibrillators within reach of all people in the Northern Territory - it is the only way to give people a chance of survival."

The defibrillator program is close to Ms Barker's heart, especially since losing her Aunt to sudden cardiac arrest in 2015.

"She died at a shopping centre on the way to see her GP because she was feeling unwell," Ms Barker said. "Unfortunately, there was no defibrillator nearby when her heart stopped. Like so many families all over Australia, we lost a loved one who could have been saved if a defibrillator had been available."

As part of the St John NT PAD program, nearly 40 defibrillators have already been placed in communities on the Tiwi Islands, across the Katherine region, remote communities including Yarralin and Timber Creek, and tourist hotspots in Litchfield National Park and Howard Springs Nature Park.

People & Culture

Recognising that our people, staff and volunteers, are our most important asset, we have continued to invest in their development and wellbeing throughout 2018/19.

After the success of the Driftwood Leadership program, we extended the range of leadership courses to include the Aspire and Professional Development Programs and opened up places to all staff and volunteers. The programs have been designed to support and develop our current and future leaders.

St John NT worked alongside communication experts Coach Communication to develop our Communications Commitments. As an organisation we then took this one step further with the creation of a Leadership Commitment Statement that all of the Executive Leadership Team have signed up to. This piece of work was undertaken as a result of our 2017 Staff Survey. As an organisation we recognise that what our staff tell us matters and in 2019/2020 we will be repeating the survey.

Recognising Excellence

The organisation continues to recognise the excellence of its employees through the St John NT Annual Awards. Awards were



given across the organisation to our ambulance service staff, volunteers and corporate staff. Our congratulations go out to all of our finalists and award winners. We also congratulate those who were inducted or advanced through the Order of St John.

Reconciliation Action Plan

A Reconciliation Action (RAP) plan committee was established, with a cross section of the organisation represented. We have now submitted our Reflect RAP with Reconciliation Australia for approval. In the meantime we are progressing with a number of actions from the plan.

Paramedic Registration

Paramedics became registered health professionals under National Law and from 1 December 2018 all persons wishing to practice under the title of paramedic were required to be registered with the Paramedicine Board of Australia. This is great recognition of how far paramedicine has progressed as a profession and an acknowledgement of its importance.



Work Health and Safety

2018/19 saw a number of initiatives including the development and endorsement by the Executive Leadership Team of the Work Health & Safety Standards which forms the basis of our Safety Management System (SMS). The SMS comprises 17 standards to manage safety and will ensure that we are doing the right thing by our staff and volunteers in terms of their safety.

Other initiatives introduced this year include:

- Development of the Contractor Management system to ensure compliance by contractors working for or on St John NT premises.
- Management of workplace injuries and return to work placements for injured workers. This program will support our staff and their needs, enabling them to return to work as soon as possible.

Mental Health and Wellbeing

The Mental Health and Wellbeing Strategy 2019-22 was launched on 27 November 2018 by the Minister for Health (NT) Hon Natasha Fyles MLA and St John NT CEO Judith Barker. To date a significant

amount of work has been undertaken in delivering on the strategy's initiatives including:

- The introduction of the Significant Events Register. The register tracks significant events that our ambulance services staff and volunteers have been involved in to ensure that they are receiving appropriate support.
- Our managers and supervisors have undergone Trauma and Resilience Training to enable them to recognise when their staff may require additional support and assistance and the most effective ways for them to offer this support.
- All of our new paramedics, patient transport officers and emergency medical dispatchers are undergoing a new self-care program that will assist them in building resilience to manage stressors in both their work and personal life.
- Introduction of Bystander Assistance Cards. These cards are designed to provide information for where and how community members who have been involved in a significant event may seek assistance for their own mental health wellbeing. The cards are designed to be handed out by our paramedics and patient transport officers at the scene.

Mental Health & Wellbeing

STRATEGY LAUNCH

NOVEMBER 27, 2018



On November 27, with the assistance of Minister for Health, the Honourable Natasha Fyles, we launched our Mental Health and Wellbeing 2019-2022. It is essential that all St John NT staff and volunteers work together on breaking down barriers around mental health issues. The new mental

health and wellbeing strategic framework will enable staff and volunteers to build their own psychological wellbeing plan tailored for their individual needs and based on their individual circumstances.

The strategy also aims to identify and create better pathways to help and support staff and volunteers through work related and personal stress and crisis situations.

Opening up the conversation around mental health issues and offering better access to early support systems can assist in times of crisis and helps to build strength and resilience within the St John NT team.

This strategy has complete support from both the Board and the Executive Leadership Team of St John NT as we recognise the need to invest in our most valuable asset, our people.

To bring the strategy to life we will be engaging with our people, unions and our partners in emergency services to create and deliver on the action plans. Together we all have a shared responsibility to create a psychologically healthy and safe workplace.

The highlight of the day was the putting competition back at the clubhouse where a 3 metre putt round robin competition was held



Roland Chin FCA FCPA CStJ Treasurer



Discussion and Analysis of Financial Report

Information on St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. and its Controlled Entities for the Concise Financial Report

The concise financial report is an extract from the financial report for the year ended 30 June 2019. The financial report and disclosures in the concise financial report have been derived from the 2019 Financial Report of St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. (St John NT) and its controlled entities. The concise financial report cannot be expected to provide as detailed an understanding of the financial performance, financial position and financing and investing activities of St John NT as the full financial report. A copy of the full financial report and auditor's report will be sent to any member, free of charge, upon request.

The discussion and analysis is provided to assist members in understanding the concise financial report. The discussion and analysis is based on the St John NT financial report and the information contained in the concise report has been derived from the full 2019 Financial Report of St John NT.

In accordance with Australian Accounting Standards, AASB 10: Consolidated Financial Statements, the Association's Executive Committee has determined that the Association is the Parent entity of St John Ambulance Australia NT Holdings Pty Limited and The St John Ambulance (NT) Endowment Trust as it has control over these entities. As such, the Financial Statements have been prepared to depict consolidated financials in addition to the Association's financials.

Dollar values in all financial schedules are reported to the nearest \$000's as indicated. Dollar values reported in commentary and text notes are reported to the nearest dollar.



Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income - St John NT

Revenue and Cost of Sales

Ambulance

Northern Territory Government (NTG) Funding

Funds received from the NTG for the provision of road transport ambulance services in designated Northern Territory regions during the 2018/19 financial year totalled \$32,301,200.

Transport Revenue

Transport revenues have decreased by 7% over the last financial year with an increasing number of patients being covered by concession schemes.

Volunteer First Aid Services and Commercial Operations

The Volunteer operating deficit totalled \$142k. This includes the last instalment of federal grant funding totalling \$590k. These funds were applied to the new Volunteer and Training centre in Alice Springs which officially opened in September 2018.

First Aid Training revenue increased by 6% with just over 500

additional students trained year on year. Students continue to highly rate the quality of training they receive.

First Aid Product Sales net profit decreased by 24%, totalling \$468k in 2018/19. Revenue decreased by 14% year on year and is the first time in many years the growth in sales has taken a downward trend. The current economic climate has contributed to this and marketing strategies are being worked on to bring in more customers.

Workshop net profit totalled \$255k, a decrease of 34% from 2018. Revenue reduced by \$79k resulting from the wind up of the remote health build contract. St John NT has made a submission for the new contract tender early in 2019 and we await the outcome.

With only one vehicle being leased, contract department activity has been minimal with net profit totalling \$17k for the year. It's anticipated the contract department will maintain a minimal level of activity into the future but continue to monitor and tender for new business as it arises.



Expenditure

Personnel costs increased by 6% primarily relating to Enterprise Agreement increments and a considerable rise in workers compensation premium due to the increased level of risk insurers have placed on our workforce. Short term contract employment during the year totalled \$154k (nil in 2018) due to requirements of short term coverage and staff turnover.

A reduction in the 2018/19 depreciation expense is largely due to an aging fleet with a reducing written down value and a later than anticipated roll out of the new ePCR Panasonic tablets.

Operational costs increased slightly by 2% year on year. Primarily we saw an increase in motor vehicle expenses as result of major repairs carried out on older vehicles.

Occupancy costs increased by 3% resultant upon recognising a full years' worth of rent on the workshop extension which commenced in March 2018. The Group has commenced solar system projects for each property held and should see a continued decline in electricity charges over the coming years.

Administration costs have increased by 16% resulting from increased legal fees due to the management of employment matters and the on-going Enterprise Agreement negotiations. Through the investment in our people and organisation, we experienced a \$149k increase in consultancy costs for various training and development programs.

Statement of Financial Position and Cash Flows

The decrease in net cash during the year is due to a combination of increased expenditure and reduced transport revenue.

Additional capital expenditure resulted from the role out of the critical response unit vehicles, completion of the new Volunteer and Training centre in Alice Springs and the role out of 50 new ePCR Panasonic tablets for Ambulance operations.

Trade Creditor & Other Payables at the end of 2018/19 have increased due to additional accruals and large June invoices.

Leave provision increases reflect a growing and stable workforce achieving entitlement triggers for long service leave. Also applicable is an incremental application to the prior year balances to reflect wage growth.

Statement of Changes in Equity

Changes in equity are attributable to the Total Comprehensive Income for the financial year.

These financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis on the assumption that sufficient government funding will be provided to St John Ambulance Australia (NT) Inc. in the future.
